Board of Education- Fred Pedersen	Great board meeting Monday. Discussions of safety and security and suicides. Board will move as quickly as possible on those issues.
	Attended partnership for a healthy community at middle school yesterday. Very impressed with CAPA students and Huddle students.
Superintendent - Joelle Madgar	Going full strength with Bond campaign. In the middle of doing coffee talks. One a week up to bond issue. Some coffee talks are public, but most are private.
	Over 100 people showed up for the board meeting to discuss safety. The message shared was "we can always do better". Nothing is 100% foolproof. Will be putting together a safety committee to comprehensively vet all of the ideas that have been suggested. Chris Coad put together a presentation, available on Website, to show where we are on safety. Several issues that were brought up were already fixed.
	Rally – A group was going to do something regardless of school involvement. Kids need to hear that they are valued and that there are others who care about them. Great support received from the community. Understands that this is not the end solution, but views it as a kick off for more programs to come. Kids are stressed and need to hear these messages. The message is all positive and will be appropriate for all ages. Permission slips were not necessary because it is on school campus. Safety precautions are strong.
	Question about what guidance counselors do with troubled youth. Counselor protocol is to do an assessment and then gets parents involved. In the most recent incident, counselors were in daily contact with the parents. If they are over 18, the protocol still applies if they are still in school.
	Suggestion for full time counselors at each building. Suggestion for counselor with mental health specialization, not just guidance.
	Will be discussion at meeting on March 5 with principals around protests scheduled for March 14 and April 20.
	Forecast is for sunny and 50 – It goes on rain or shine. There are contingency plans if it becomes absolutely necessary.
	All speakers have direct guidance on the message and what can and cannot be talked about. Just adversity and sadness and what to do if you feel those things.
	Question about response to site selection – So far quiet. Only issue is about wetlands. City has committed to prep land before school construction to begin. Current fields will remain intact. City will upgrade stadium drive. There will be plenty of parking.

	Mental Health Training and Support at the High School The faculty, staff, and administration at the high school are devastated by our most recent tragedy and are continuing to investigate how we can better meet the mental health and wellness needs of our students. We have received an outcry from our students and parents for action, and we would like to share that this has always been a focus for us, but we are working hard to improve upon what we have been doing. We are also inviting students, parents, and staff to focus groups to help us better meet the needs as identified by our team and stakeholders. Below is a summary of what we are currently or have done to be prepared for our students along with things we are working on for the future.
	 Current Programming and Training The LifeAct Recognizing Teen Depression and Suicide Prevention is part of our Health class curriculum and is led by their staff of expert mental health instructors. All students receive a warning signs wallet card that includes suicide hotline contact information. This fall our staff had a mental health professional development opportunity during our inservice day. All high school staff were led through the Kognito mental health role playing simulations with our counseling team to better prepare the to identify, talk with, and refer students exhibiting at risk behaviors. School counselors annually visit ninth grade classrooms during the second week of school to introduce themselves, explain how they can help, share warning signs, and provide information on how to seek out help when they need it.

Student led initiatives: Mental Health Awareness Week, Mental Health Mural, and Youth Mental Health Panel participation at Chardon HS Programming, Training, and Planning for the Future School counselors will visit all grade levels for a classroom presentation to discuss mental health, warning signs, review how to report concerns or get help. They will also discuss how mental health is equally if not more important than physical health emphasizing the need to report changes in feelings and how to get support. We are in the process of coordinating expert speaker from the Cleveland Clinic on adolescent mental health for parent presentations. All high school teachers will attend a three hour mental health professional development program during the March inservice day. Collaboration with the Cuyahoga County Library-Brecksville Branch on presentation and book discussion. Author Ken Ginsburg, Raising Kids to Thrive: Balancing Love With Expectations and Protection With Trust. HUDDLE president created See Something Say Something anonymous reporting poster with snapchat code link. Youth-led promoting of new reporting opportunity.
